Anchor Institutions

It is broadly recognized that over 60 percent of the factors which contribute to good health are related to the social determinants of health (SDH). These are the conditions within the environments where people are born, grow, work, live, and age, and the wider set of forces and systems shaping the conditions of daily life^{1,2}. Health care institutions around the world are moving upstream to address these socioeconomic factors. By adopting an anchor mission, these institutions are moving beyond their traditional role of providing medical care and recognizing the potential to influence the health and well-being of their local communities by creating shared value.

What are Anchor Institutions?

Anchor institutions are large, typically non-profit institutions that are unlikely to relocate. They have a large stake in a geographical area because they are "anchored" in their communities^{3,4}. Examples include universities, health centers, or local government entities⁴. Anchor institutions have substantial assets that can be used for community wealth building as well as an economic selfinterest in ensuring their communities are safe and healthy^{3,4}. This **Population Health** series explores the concept of population health and the role a hospital can play in producing population health. The series also offers local and international examples of health systems that have reached beyond their walls to improve the health of their communities.

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
There are over 65 healthcare institutions in the United States (U.S.) that have adopted an anchor mission including, Intermountain Healthcare, Geisinger, Boston Medical, Boston Children's Hospital, Kaiser Permanente, and Henry Ford Health System. Table 1 illustrates what these health systems have committed to as part of their anchor mission and the impact of those commitments on improving institutional and community outcomes.

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In its long-term plan, NHS England made a commitment to work with the Health Foundation to develop the role of local NHS organizations as anchor institutions in their communities³. Similar to the anchor mission activities of healthcare institutions in the U.S., NHS organizations are also cognizant of their impact on the environment and local communities (see image below).
